Sermons from the Gospel of Luke

Enemies Luke 6:27-36

1. Christians love those intent on causing them harm and will do what is good for enemies instead of seeking their own satisfaction or advantage.

The ones who receive my love are the ones who are against me, who are out to cause me harm, who can take advantage of me.

Jesus' command to love assumes I will consistently risk being engaged intimately with my enemies to act in their long-term best interests.

When I love my enemies, I bring about good things for them. 6:27

When I love my enemies, I ask God to pour His grace and goodness upon them so they will know Him and their lives will be transformed. 6:28

When I love my enemies, I take them with me in spirit into the presence of God. 6:28

When I love my enemies, I am generous in meeting their needs even if taken advantage of and I receive nothing in return. 6:30

Do I love my enemies? What can I do today to show the love of Christ?

2. Jesus indicates that my enemies deserve to be loved by me in this way because this is how God loves His enemies, including me.

My love for my enemies is not to express my affection or opinion, but God's character.

When I express God's loving kindness to the unmerciful and the wicked, my blessings from God will be great.

I need to move beyond what people deserve, what I think they have earned, and actively do good to them regardless. God will make this kind of love worth it to me in eternity.

Do I act toward and engage with others the way Jesus does with me?
