Sermons from Luke: Affluence and the Afterlife

1. My affluence, or material wealth, can make me callous to the material needs of others, possibly resulting in a harmful and ungodly selfcenteredness. 16:19-21

Jesus emphasizes the wealth and comfort of the rich man. 16:19

The callous heart of the rich man is revealed in how the ongoing suffering of Lazarus occurred at the rich man's gate. 16:20-21

The stark contrast between the rich man and Lazarus violates all the ethical teachings of God's Holy Scripture.



How do my lifestyle choices contribute to and magnify economic disparity locally and around the world? Has my comfort made me callous to God's commands to care for those in need?

2. There is life after death for all people: both the good and bad. 16:22-26

The afterlife provides an opportunity for the injustices of life on earth to be corrected. 16:22-25

There is a clear and unbridgeable divide between heaven and hell. There is no second chance of salvation after death. 16:26

Have I made preparation for my eternal destiny by trusting in Christ for salvation? How do my lifestyle choices reveal the truth of my commitment to Christ, or lack of it?

3. My eternal destiny depends on my response to God, who has revealed Himself to me in Jesus Christ. 16:27-31

God has already told us all we need to know in order to be saved from eternal suffering. 16:27-29

Evidence of supernatural realities and miracles are of no value if the heart is not right. Only a responsive heart will listen to God's message and respond to His great works. 16:30-31

How have I responded to what God has already revealed to me?

I invite you to consider how your lifestyle choices impact the lives of others. Has your comfort made you callous to God's commands to care for those in need?

I invite you to prepare for your eternal destiny by trusting in Christ for salvation. Turn from sin and walk in the ways of God.
